The Kindle Edition of *164 and More*™ contains over 53,000 Big Book and 12&12 passages arranged alphabetically by 8,100 keywords. Additionally there is extensive documentation on how to search, navigate, and get the most from the particular model of Kindle, smart phone, tablet, or computer you are using.

The *164 and More* eBook is designed to be used immediately. It is recommended that you begin using *164 and More* and then refer to the documentation as needed.

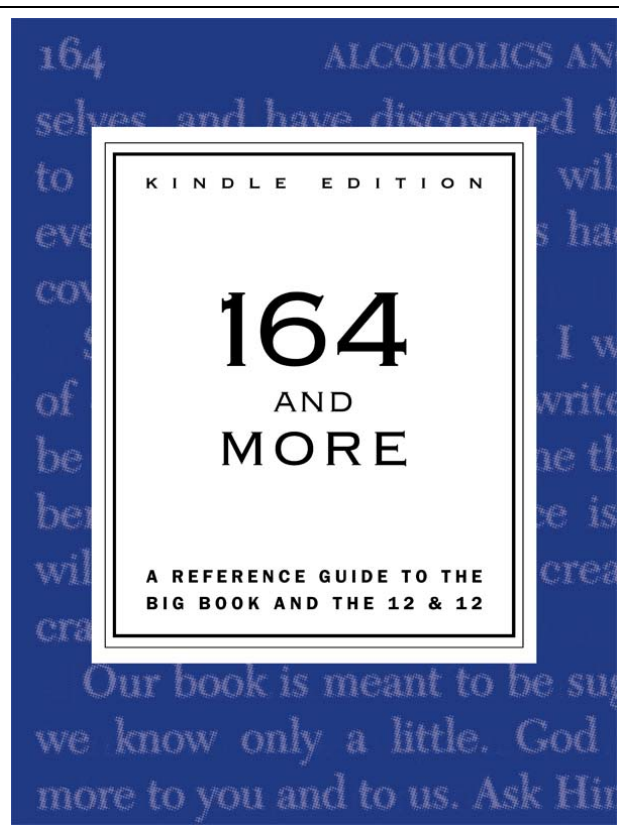
The Table of Contents is the quickest way to access the documentation. A Contents button on most screens will take you to the Contents screen. Below are screen shots of the various topics. Screen shots were created using a Kindle Keyboard (3rd generation) using the next-to-smallest sans serif font.



1. Cover

With a Kindle device, the cover does not display automatically. You can bring up the cover manually using the Kindle Menu key and Go To option.

With non-Kindle devices such as smart phones, tablets, PC and Mac computers, the *164 and More* cover is usually displayed as an icon on your device “bookshelf.”



2. Table of Contents

The Contents screen lists a number of topics which describe *164 and More* features. Sample pages are provided for the words EGO, HONESTY, and SACRIFICE.

The Device Information section explains how to use *164 and More* with each model of the Kindle. Information is also provided for smart phones, tablets, and PC or Mac computers.

There are two search methods ... the Built-in Search and the Word Index. Refer to your device in the Device Information section for recommendations on which search method works best. Try both search methods to see which you prefer.

Introduction

164 and More™ was created for men and women interested in the Alcoholics Anonymous program of recovery. Often from their very first A.A. meeting, they remember and repeat short catch-phrases from the A.A. literature. For example ...

- acceptance is the answer
- liquor was but a symptom
- pain was the touchstone of all spiritual progress
- sense of ease and comfort
- spiritual axiom that every time we are disturbed
- sunlight of the spirit
- we are without defense against the first drink
- we pause when agitated or doubtful

While catch-phrases are popular and easy to remember, the incredible richness of the A.A. literature offers so much more. A thorough reading of the paragraphs surrounding the catch-phrase usually reveals a message which cannot possibly be captured in a few words. *164 and More* will help you find passages within the A.A. literature.

Whether you attend Big Book or Step studies, read the literature at home, or read and discuss chapters with your sponsor, you'll find the passage you seek, quickly and accurately.

164 and More is only a tool for studying the A.A. literature. You will need a copy of *Alcoholics Anonymous* (the Big Book), and the *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions*. These two books contain the roadmap to recovery which millions have used successfully, one day at a time.

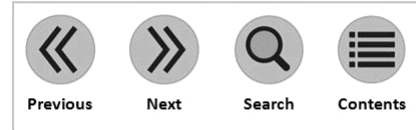

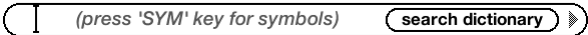
How to Navigate

One or more navigation buttons are available at the top of most *164 and More* screens.



Tap a button if you use a Kindle Touch, smart phone or tablet. Use the 5-way key to select a button on Kindle Keyboard or Kindle models.

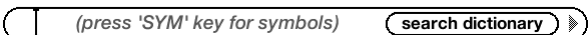
- **Contents:** Access feature descriptions and device-specific information for Kindles, smart phones, tablets and computers.
- **Search:** Go to the Word Index. Select a letter of the alphabet and choose a word of interest from the list of words beginning with that letter.
- **Next:** While using the Word Index, retrieves the next letter of the alphabet. While viewing a word and its passages, calls up the next word in alphabetical order. This is helpful to quickly see variations of the

word; for example SACRIFICE > SACRIFICED > SACRIFICES > SACRIFICIAL > SACRIFICING.

- **Previous:** While using the Word Index, retrieves the previous letter of the alphabet. While viewing a word and its passages, calls up the previous word in alphabetical order.



12. Using the Built-in Search

164 and More contains two search methods ... the Built-in Search and the Word Index.

The Built-in Search works best with actual Kindles. As you key your search word, matches are displayed as you type each letter. You can quickly find the word you are seeking.

With a non-Kindle device, matches are not displayed as you type, letter by letter. Instead, you must enter the complete word. If the full word you keyed is found in *164 and More*, you will get **one** hit. Selecting that hit retrieves matching passages in the Big Book and 12&12.

The Kindle Fire and other Android devices do not currently recognize the *164 and More* index structure; hence, the Built-in Search is not too useful. Use the Word Index instead.

13. Using the Word Index

164 and More contains two search methods ... the Built-in Search and the Word Index.

The Word Index works best with touch-screen Kindles, smart phones and tablets. It can also be used on Kindles with keyboards.

The Kindle Touch, iPad and iPhone are well suited for either the Built-in Search or the Word Search.

Try both search methods yourself.



Using the Built-in Search

Kindle Keyboard, Kindle, and Kindle Touch models have a built-in search feature. Words are entered on a physical or onscreen keyboard. The built-in search is recommended with these devices. Key in the first few letters from your word of interest; matching words will display. Select the word you want and passages containing that word will appear.

The search box is shown below for keyboard and touch-screen versions of the Kindle.

Kindle Keyboard and Kindle models --

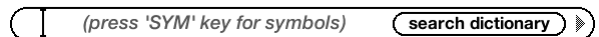


Kindle Touch model --



Non-Kindle smart phones, tablets and computers using a Kindle Reading App also have a built-in search. However, depending on the type of non-Kindle device you are using, the built-in search may be slow, imprecise, or cumbersome. If so, try the [Word Index](#) instead.

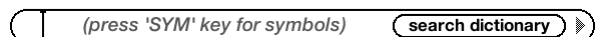


Using the Word Index

The Word Index works the same on all Kindle models as well as non-Kindle smart phones, tablets and computers. To call up the Word Index, tap or select the Search button found at the top of many screens. Choose a letter of the alphabet, then select from the words beginning with that letter.

For words like **EX**PERIENCE which is near the end of the E's, try selecting the *next* letter of the alphabet. It will be faster to select the letter F and then turn pages backwards into the E's.

The Word Index is most effective when using a touch screen. A non-touch Kindle can still use the Word Index, but moving the cursor with the 5-way key can be a little tedious. For Kindle Keyboard models, try the [Built-in Search](#) instead.

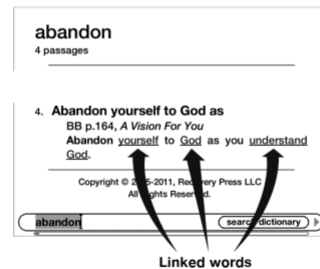

As you browse the passages containing your word of interest, notice that other significant words are underlined. You can select these linked words and retrieve their list of passages.

With a touch screen, tap a linked word to bring up its passages. With a non-touch screen, use the 5-way key to move the cursor and select the linked word.

15. Kindle Family Overview

A recap of the two search methods is provided followed by overviews on the various models of the Kindle family of devices.

Kindle Family Overview

164 and More is compatible with all Kindle models. Two search methods are provided ...

- The **Built-in Search** is a standard feature on Kindle devices as well as Kindle Reading Apps for smart phones, tablets or computers. For Kindle devices, the built-in search is recommended. For some types of non-Kindle devices, the built-in search can be slow, imprecise, and cumbersome. If so, try the Word Index instead. For more information, see the Notes below for your device.
- The **Word Index** is a tap-not-type feature intended for touch screens. It can also be used on a Kindle with a keyboard ... move the cursor with the 5-way key; then select the button or word you want.

If you are not sure which Kindle model you have, look at the following pictures. Each Kindle model is linked to Notes for that model.

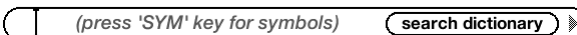
Kindle models with a Keyboard



Kindle Keyboard is the original Kindle (2007) as well as models introduced in 2009 and 2010. If you have a physical keyboard, your model is the Kindle Keyboard.



Kindle is a compact version of the Kindle Keyboard; it was introduced in 2011. There is a 5-way key; also buttons for Home, Menu, Back, and the onscreen keyboard.

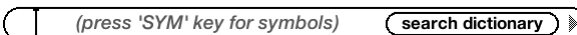
Kindle models with a Touch Screen



Kindle Touch is a touch-screen model introduced in 2011. An onscreen keyboard is available for typing. Other than Power, the only physical button is Home which takes you to the main Kindle screen.



Kindle Fire is a full-featured color tablet introduced in 2011. Included is the ability to read Kindle eBooks. The only physical button is Power.



18. Notes: Kindle Keyboard

In 2011, several new Kindle models were introduced by Amazon. At that time, the original three generations of Kindle models were collectively renamed “Kindle Keyboard” since they all have a physical keyboard.

If your Kindle has a physical keyboard, then you have a Kindle Keyboard model.

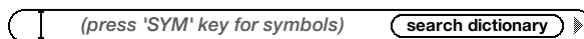
Cursor tips:

The cursor is initially positioned inside the search box at the bottom of the screen. In order to select a word or button, try these tips using the 5-way key ...

- To select one of the round navigation buttons, press DOWN on the 5-way key. Then use RIGHT to move the cursor to the button you want, followed by ENTER.
- To select a linked word, move the cursor by pressing UP or DOWN depending on whether the word is closer to the bottom or top of the screen.

Built-in Search (recommended):

The Kindle search box is at the bottom of every screen. Type a few letters and use the 5-way key to

Word Index:

Use the 5-way key to select the Search button found on most screens. Then, select a letter of the alphabet and turn pages to find the word you want. Select the word; Big Book and 12&12 passages will appear.

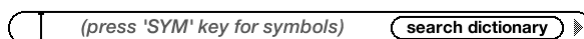
To lookup word definitions, the Kindle Dictionary must be set to one of the Oxford dictionaries. Place the cursor in front of any word; a brief definition of the word will appear. Press the RETURN key to see the full definition.

Link to 164 and More from another eBook:

The Kindle Dictionary must be set to 164 and More. Place the cursor in front of the word you want and press the RETURN key. Big Book and 12&12 passages containing that word will appear.

21. Notes: Kindle

The Kindle model was introduced in 2011 and is the successor to the original Kindle and Kindle DX. Beginning in 2011, Kindles utilize an onscreen keyboard; they no longer have physical keyboards with buttons for each letter.

The new Kindle has physical buttons below the screen for Home, Menu, Back, and to bring up the onscreen keyboard. As with the original Kindle models, there is a 5-way controller key.

Cursor tips:

The cursor is initially positioned inside the search box at the bottom of the screen. In order to select a word or button, try these tips ...

- When using the 5-way key to select a word or a round navigation button, press ENTER *twice*. Think of it like double-clicking with a mouse. The first ENTER brings up a menu of choices. The second ENTER causes the Kindle to follow the link to the word or button you selected.
- To select one of the round navigation buttons, press DOWN on the 5-way key. Then use RIGHT to move the cursor to the button you want, followed by ENTER-ENTER.
- To select a **linked word**, move the cursor by pressing UP or DOWN depending on whether the

word is closer to the bottom or top of the screen. Then press ENTER-ENTER to select that word.

Built-in Search (recommended):

Press the KEYBOARD button just left of the 5-way key; the onscreen keyboard will appear. Type a few letters and use the 5-way key to select from the list of matches.

Word Index:

Use the 5-way key to select the Search button found on most screens. Then, select a letter of the alphabet and turn pages to find the word you want. Select the word; Big Book and 12&12 passages will appear.

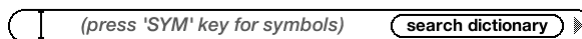
Table of Contents:

Use the 5-way key to select the Contents button at the top of the screen. You can also use the Kindle built-in "Go To" feature to select the Table of Contents.

Definition of a Word:

To lookup word definitions, the Kindle Dictionary must be set to one of the Oxford dictionaries. Place the cursor in front of any word; a brief definition of the word will appear. Press ENTER and a one-line menu displays. If necessary, use LEFT on the 5-way key to select the "Full Definition" choice. Then, press ENTER for the full definition.

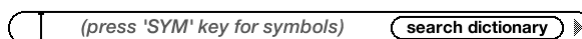

The Kindle Dictionary must be set to 164 and More. Place the cursor in front of the word you want and press ENTER-ENTER on the 5-way key. Big Book and 12&12 passages containing that word will appear.

Change the Kindle Dictionary:

In order to retrieve word definitions or link to 164 and More from other eBooks you may need to change the Kindle Dictionary setting ...

- Press HOME.
- Press MENU.
- Select **Settings** and press ENTER.
- The Dictionaries setting is on the second page of Settings. Move the cursor to EDIT next to "Dictionaries" and press ENTER.
- Press ENTER to change the default.
- Select the dictionary you want and press ENTER.
- Press HOME and proceed.

The Kindle Touch was introduced in 2011 and is the first Kindle reader with a touch screen. The only buttons are the Home key below the screen and the power on/off button.

Both the Built-in Search and the Word Index are recommended. Try both to determine your preference.

Built-in Search (recommended):

Tap the Kindle search box to bring up an onscreen keyboard. Enter the first few letters from your word of interest. Tap GO if the word you want is first on the list of matches. Otherwise, tap anywhere on the list to dispatch the keyboard; then tap the word you want.

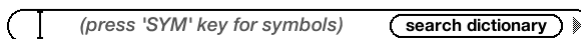
Tap the Search button found on most screens. Then, tap a letter of the alphabet and turn pages to find the word you want. Tap the word; Big Book and 12&12 passages will appear.

Table of Contents:

Tap the Contents button or use the Kindle built-in "Go To" feature to select the Table of Contents.

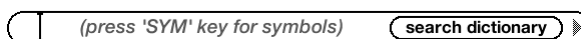
Link to 164 and More from another eBook:

The Kindle Dictionary must be set to 164 and More. When you see a word you want to lookup in the Big Book and 12&12, press and hold the word. When it highlights, release the word. Tap "Show Full Definition" to see passages from the Big Book and the 12&12.

Change the Kindle Dictionary:

In order to retrieve word definitions or link to 164 and More from other eBooks you may need to change the Kindle Dictionary setting ...

- Press HOME (physical button below the screen).
- Tap MENU.
- Tap the Settings choice.
- Tap Dictionaries; the current setting will appear.
- Tap the name of the current Dictionary setting; names of other available dictionaries will appear.
- To change the setting, tap the name of the dictionary you want. Then, tap OK to save the change.
- Press the physical HOME button and proceed.

The Kindle Fire is a full-featured tablet using an Amazon-tailored version of the Android operating system.

Currently, the Kindle Fire does not recognize the indexing structure contained in *164 and More*. This causes searches using the Fire's built-in search to be imprecise. You can see this yourself. Search for the word ANGER ... you will also get matches for DANGER, HANGER, and STRANGER.

It is recommended that the Word Index be used for searching with the Kindle Fire.

Touch Screen: Yes.

Built-in Search:

The built-in search on the Kindle Fire is a text search and does not use the indices contained within *164 and More*. It can be slow and imprecise. For example, if you search for ANGER, you will also get matches for DANGER, HANGER, and STRANGER. Try the Word Index instead.

Word Index (recommended):

Tap the Search button found on most screens. Then, tap a letter of the alphabet and turn pages to find the word you want. Tap the word; Big Book and 12&12 passages will appear.

Table of Contents:

Currently, Android phones and tablets do not recognize the indexing structure contained in *164 and More*. This causes searches using the Android built-in search to be imprecise. You can see this yourself. Search for the word ANGER ... you will also get matches for DANGER, HANGER, and STRANGER.

It is recommended that the Word Index be used with Android smart phones and tablets.

Other devices such as the iPhone or iPad can be used successfully with either the Built-In Search or the Word Index.

iPhone and iPad devices: If the word you enter exists in the Big Book or the 12&12, the built-in search retrieves ONE match. This single match is the list of passages; select it to retrieve passages for your word.

Android phones and tablets: The built-in search on Android devices is a text search and does not use the indices contained within *164 and More*. It can be slow and imprecise. For example, if you search for ANGER, you will also get matches for DANGER, HANGER, and STRANGER. Try the Word Index instead.

Tap the Search button found on most screens. Then, tap a letter of the alphabet and turn pages to find the word you want. Tap the word; Big Book and 12&12 passages will appear.

All passages containing your word of interest are displayed alphabetically. For example, the word MOTIVE occurs in 9 passages as follows ...

motive underneath a good one,
motive was to feel superior

When passages are alphabetized, "motive became..." is found toward the top of the list while "motive underneath..." is near the bottom. The value of alphabetizing is most evident when there are hundreds of passages containing your word of interest. Simply turn pages while glancing at the alphabetized passages. You'll quickly find the one you seek.

33. Link from Other eBooks

While reading other eBooks on your Kindle, you can select a word and see where it is referenced in the Big Book and the 12&12.

Currently, only an actual Kindle is able to link from other eBooks to *164 and More*. The Amazon Kindle Reading App for smart phones, tablets, and computers does not support the Search Dictionary feature required to link to *164 and More*.



Link from Other eBooks

When using a Kindle Keyboard, Kindle, or Kindle Touch model, there is a feature which allows cross-referencing between another eBook and the *164 and More* Reference Guide. This feature is currently not supported by the Kindle Fire or by Kindle Reading Apps on smart phones, tablets and computers.

To enable this feature, change the Dictionary setting from the default *New Oxford American Dictionary to 164 and More*. A step-by-step procedure is contained in the [Notes](#) for your particular Kindle model. Also, the Dictionary setting is documented in the *Kindle User's Guide* for your model.

Once enabled, you could be reading another recovery-oriented eBook. Perhaps you see a particular word and would like to know where it is used in the Big Book or the 12&12. Do the following ...

- **Kindle Keyboard:** Move the cursor in front of the word. If that word exists in the Big Book or 12&12, a small window will appear at the top or bottom of the screen. You'll see the passage count for the word. Press the RETURN button to display the passage list.

- **Kindle:** Move the cursor in front of the word. If that

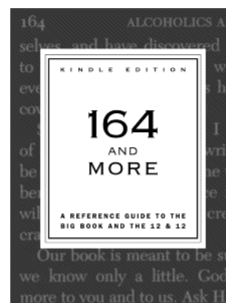

Tapping the Search button displays the Word Index.

The Word Index is recommended for devices with touch screens. These include the Kindle Touch, Kindle Fire, smart phones, and tablets. Using a mouse, the Word Index works well with PC and Mac computers.

The Word Index can also be used with non-touch screens such as the Kindle Keyboard and Kindle models. The 5-way controller key allows you to navigate and select words or buttons.
